Pretty Paws Care Tips: **Regular Grooming**

Now that the Holidays are behind us, many of you have a dog that visited the groomer to get all pretty or handsome for the holidays. Do you have your next grooming appointment scheduled? It is important to have your dog regularly maintained, not just for the holidays.

If you have the breed of dog that needs to be groomed, you have to maintain the dog's coat to keep them healthy and comfortable.

Longhaired breeds and breeds that do not shed need to have regular professional grooming visits. Professional grooming appointments include nail clipping, ear cleaning, baths, anal gland expression (if needed), clipping/trimming, drying and brushing. Some longhaired dogs may not need much trimming but it is especially important to have the hair between their toes trimmed so that they do not develop painful mats.

Also remember to brush your dog regularly in between grooming appointments so that they do not acquire mats that need to be clipped out.

Please research and know the time commitment and responsibility of the breed of dog you choose to get before you get it.
